Includes information about Smith's grandparents, parents, experiences in Nauvoo, immigration west in 1847, settlement in Parowan, Church and civic activities in Iron County, militia duties during Indian wars, missions to Scandinavia, and settlement in Arizona. Handwritten, 1 page. Account of a conversation with Jacob Hamblin in 1884, wherein Hamblin told of hearing Joseph Smith's teaching concerning the resurrection of children.



4. Jesse N. Smith, Journal, 1904-1906

Handwritten, 36 pages. Contains a daily account of Smith's travels as president of the Snowflake Arizona Stake. Recounts his ordination as a patriarch, and some of the legal troubles he faced in regards to plural marriage. <u>Page 19</u> mentions his speaking at General Conference and the tribute by Joseph F. Smith. Also includes a few entries recorded in 1941 by descendent Edith S. Bushman.

Relates experiences with his father, the Book of Mormon, and hearing Brigham Young speak. Joseph F. Smith follows with a tribute to Jesse as "a modern Nathaniel—a man in whom there is no guile." Contains the fullest telling of the Book of Mormon story.




